Vicar's Musings

This week I would like to thank the people who came to help clean St Michael's Church so that we can open for private prayer on Sunday 5th July 10am-12pm.







Also to those who helped move pews and clean St Eadburgha's Church. We won't be opening as yet for private prayer but we are a step closer and hope to open for private prayer as soon as it is safe to do so.

St Mary's Childswickham hopes to open it's doors for private prayer Monday 20th July—this is due to the amount of cleaning involved which is more complicated than we thought. At the moment, St John's, Wickhamford remains closed due to it's risk assessment.

As per the whole country each PCC and local area with the support of the Bishops and Archdeacons are going through risk assessments and guidelines which change daily, some of which is contradictory. The challenge is trying to make our places of worship safe whilst also gauging the congregations and local community attitudes to our buildings and also trying to balance what worship and support we can offer. Last week I sent around a survey and I thank those who have responded—the information will help our PCC's make decisions about public worship. The 5 I've had back so far all agree it's too early to start public worship yet but as have different views on when we should restart but the majority so far is September.—but this is only 5 responses. I attach the survey again and ask you to please fill it in or email me your thoughts on the questions asked.

This Sunday we will film opening St Michael's Church for private prayer and open the doors for the first time and say a prayer—which I will post on our website, WhatsApp group and Facebook and twitter accounts. This is the first step into the new normal for our congregations.

We have travelled along a hard road through the pandemic, and it is

abundantly clear that the journey is not over yet. If an effective vaccine can be developed, it will still be many months before this is ready or even in circulation, and we must take extraordinary care over our part to prevent further mass outbreaks. It is possible that lockdown restrictions will be imposed again, either across the UK, or regionally or even more locally.

The new normal for church has changed everything we know about church and probably our lives and how we live them has changed.

I don't know about you but Sundays feel weird. Normally Sundays are energising, challenging and exhausting. On Sundays we get to do the things we are called and trained to do; preach, lead worship and connect with people we love. (I will admit to not missing the dashing between services). Now a typical Sunday consists of watching a pre-recorded service or 'Songs of Praise' or making small talk in an online chat room and prayers on WhatsApp. Those who love sport are mourning the fact that it isn't on asking questions like—if they can play football why not cricket? It's just so wrong. (mind you, I'm told this ruling has changed today).

Let's take time to celebrate and think of the positives....

We are doing things as a church we wouldn't have thought possible back in March.

Some churches are preaching to a camera and getting pretty good at it. We are connecting with people we've known for years, and people we've never met, in ways we didn't know was possible.

We are figuring out worship and prayer without being in the same room, and its working.

We are bringing hope and light to our community at a time when they desperately need it.

We are being the church in ways we couldn't have imagined way back in February.

That calls for a socially-distanced celebration!

We've lost some things that are really hard to let go of.

We did not have Good Friday walk of witness and service on the green as churches together.

We did not gather on Easter or Pentecost.

We will not go to that conference or on the holiday we've been looking forward to for months.

We've missed seeing family, friends and going out.

We've not shopped and had to let others help us and found it hard.

Each of us have lost or will lose many things, and we need to take the time to mourn.

There are many aspects of our current situation that are confining and dispiriting. Pretending that it isn't don't doesn't help.

Take some time to grieve what you've lost.

Going back to the positives and embracing the situation... I've loved seeing stories of companies pivoting right now to manufacture things they've never built before. Car makers are making ventilators, and shoe companies are making masks. It gives me hope because I see incredible innovation happening around the world.

The same innovation has to happen in the church world. We can no longer to do what we've always done but we also cannot stay in lockdown forever. The challenge is embracing change and transforming as a church which some may find uncomfortable. As I've been reading, if we're rooted in our faith we can do this and embrace what is needed from us to flourish as a church.

This Sunday we are offering Evening Prayer on Zoom and I'm sure whilst it's hopefully welcomed it will feel different and strange.

Let's be honest, it feels really strange sitting on our couches watching a pre-recorded Sunday service from another church, I doubt Zoom will feel much different albeit its live.

Some prefer it as you can mute whenever you wish and not leave your home and others will do it but wish we were back in our buildings.




There is a chance church will never be quite the same after this experience.




















Blame the Vicar
